### **FACES OF EASTER III**

Jesus went down into the darkness and chaos of the water. When John lifted him back up into the light, there were people there who said they saw a dove come down from heaven and come close to him. There were also people there that day who heard a voice. The voice said, "This is my beloved son, with whom I am well pleased."



### **WE WONDER**

Wondering is an open-ended practice where each person makes meaning for themselves. Engaging in active listening and being present with one another, there are no right answers but rather opportunities to say, "I wonder that too."

### At the end of this story, we wonder together:

I wonder if you have ever felt like you were preparing the way for something or someone? I wonder if you have ever been in a place of chaos?

I wonder what you might add to the story about Jesus being baptized in the Jordan river by John? I wonder which part of this story is especially for you?



### **WE RESPOND**

When we respond to the story or to anything that may be present in our lives, the focus for this time is on process and not product. Whether it's coloring, drawing, sculpting with clay, reading, meditating, the gift of this time and space should support each person to express themselves in the way they see fit.

# MEDITATIVE MOMENT

Throughout your day, when do you come into contact with water? Maybe early in the morning, brushing your teeth or washing dishes. Perhaps when washing your hands or grabbing a glass to quench your thirst. The next time you interact with water, take a moment and pause. Notice, how does it feel to connect with water? As you reflect on what the water feels or tastes like, close your eyes and remember your baptism. If you have not been baptized or don't remember your baptism, think about a time when you crossed through a threshold or had a big change in your life. May water remind you of experiences that have helped you form your identity and purpose.
